Please provide a meaningful summary of how you have reached the recommendation

A key recommendation made by the Homelessness and Rough Sleeping Action Group (HARSAG) and accepted by Scottish Government was a transition to a Rapid Re-housing approach for homeless households and for all Local Authorities to submit a 5-year Rapid Rehousing Transition Plan by 31st December 2018 for the period 2019/20 - 2023/24. Our Equalities Impact Assessment highlights that a transition to Rapid Rehousing in West Dunbartonshire would positively impact the homeless population by providing additional support allowing them to sustain their tenancies and reducing the number of transitions homeless people experience in temporary accommodation. However, more information is required around gender reassignment and sexual orientation to ensure the needs of these groups are being met. It is therefore recommended to proceed with Rapid Rehousing in West Dunbartonshire, however to commence routinely recording and analysis of gender reassignment and sexual orientation.
